# CREATIVE WRITING COMPETITION Six Towns Stories

Stoke Reads and the National Literacy Trust are delighted to launch an exciting new creative writing competition. 'Six Towns Stories' has been co-designed by our Youth Literacy Champions from the Co-op Academy, Tunstall, with the support of Kreative Foundations.

Stoke-on-Trent is the only city in the UK that is Polycentric, which means it has more than one centre. This makes it a unique place to journey in, to and through.

We invite children aged 7-11 from Stoke-on-Trent to create a piece of writing based on the theme 'Six Towns Stories'. <u>Tell us about a journey you or someone you know</u> <u>has been on in the city. This could be real or imagined</u>. You can choose any format you like – a story, a poem, a news article, a comic or a diary entry. You can include some illustrations, too if you like.

Everyone who enters the competition will have a chance to get their work published in an anthology and displayed in a local exhibition. There will also be book prizes for the winning entries.

Winning entries will be chosen based on originality, imagination, relation to the theme and overall enjoyment.

#### How to enter

- Use the Entry Form or up to two sides of A4 paper (this can be handwritten or typed) to complete your piece of writing.
- Ask your parent/guardian or teacher to scan or photograph your work and enter by:

# SIX TOWNS STORIES Writing Prompts

Your piece of writing can be funny and heart-warming, adventurous or exciting, fiction or non-fiction. You can choose any format you like – a story, a poem, a news article, a comic or a diary entry. You can also include some illustrations, too.

Everything is welcome!

Here are some ideas to get you started on your creative journey:

- Think about the local journeys you take every single day. It could be as small as going to the kitchen for a snack or as big as walking around Westport Lake twice! Are any of these everyday journeys special to you?
- Can you think of any places in Stoke-on-Trent that you like to visit for adventures? What fantastical feats would you get up to while you're there?
- Journeys can be experienced in lots of ways. You might have been travelling on foot. Maybe you had an epic adventure in a car or on a bus – what did you see out of the window? Can you tell us about your travels?
- Can you write about a journey that isn't set in the real world? For example, in a dreamland or in a video game?
- Have you ever been on a journey where you learnt something new or changed your perspective on something?

## **COMPETITION RULES**

The competition is open to young people aged 7-11, but entries from all primary school pupils will be considered for the exhibition.

The closing date for submission is Monday 6 March 2023. Winners will be announced on Friday 28 April 2023.

Use the Entry Form document (available for download on our website) or up to two sides of A4 paper to complete your piece of writing.

Entries can be handwritten or typed.

The piece of creative writing must be an original piece of work and be wholly written by the entrant. It must reflect the theme of the competition as stated in the competition challenge. The writing must be single-authored.

Entries must not contain obscene, defamatory, offensive or otherwise unsuitable material. The organisers reserve the right to disqualify such entries.


A team of community partners, Youth Literacy Champions from the Co-op Academy and Stoke Reads / National Literacy Trust staff will shortlist entries. Winners will be chosen by our panel of experts.

On submission, parents/guardians will be asked to grant permission to enter. They will be asked for consent to publish the entrant's writing online or in print form and/or display physical entries in public spaces.

Teachers submitting on behalf of their pupils must obtain permission from parents/ guardians prior to submission. As a teacher, by entering your pupils' work into this competition you are confirming that written parental consent has been sought and confirmed in advance of the submission. National Literacy Trust will not be held liable in the instance that consent has not been sought.


































1. The Stoke Reads 'Six Towns Stories' creative writing competition is open to children aged 7-11 years living anywhere in Stoke-on-Trent.

2. It is free of charge to enter.

3. Entries must be submitted by sending a copy of the work or a picture to Lois Bateman, Stoke Reads, Port Vale Football Club, Hamil Road, Burslem, Stoke-on-Trent ST6 1AW, or by emailing stoke@literacytrust.org.uk.

4. No responsibility is accepted for entries lost, damaged or delayed as a result of any network, computer hardware or software failure of any kind, nor for any postal damage or losses. Proof of entry will not be accepted as proof of receipt.

5. There will not be a notification of receipt for entries.

6. Prizes offered are non-transferable and non-exchangeable. However, in the event of unforeseen circumstances, the promoter reserves the right to offer alternative prizes of equal value.

7. The winner will be notified using the contact details supplied for entry and asked to acknowledge the notification.

8. If we do not receive confirmation of acceptance within two weeks of notification the prize will be forfeited and a new winner will be selected.
