The Tale of Peter Rabbit by Beatrix Potter

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Peter Rabbit is brave when he goes in Mr McGregor's garden. Chat about times when you have felt brave.	Make some bunny ears and wear them like Peter Rabbit.	Enjoy another book by Beatrix Potter. Your local library will have some.
Peter Rabbit loves his coat from Daddy. Do you have any special items?	Download the <u>Peter</u> <u>Rabbit big reading</u> <u>adventure</u> .	Have a go at growing your own vegetables.
Do you think Peter Rabbit is naughty?	Try some new vegetables and see if you like them.	Find out more about rabbits – what do they eat? How do you look after them?

Alan's big scary teeth by Jarvis

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Which is your favourite animal in the jungle?	Alan enjoys a big, muddy bath. Can you find some mud to go and splash in?	Try another book about jungle animals.
Is Alan scary without his teeth?	Use a peg to make your own snappy crocodile. Try sticking on some teeth.	Take part in a <i>Monster Morning</i> workshop on the <u>Doncaster Stories</u> <u>Facebook page</u> .
Alan is good at helping his friends. How do you help your friends?	Make a scary face in the mirror.	Can you find any other scary books in your library?

Supertato by Paul Linnet and Sue Hendra

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
How would you stop Evil Pea?	Make your own superhero vegetables. You could even make a baddie!	Enjoy one of the other <i>Supertato</i> books. You can borrow them from your library.
Are there any vegetables you don't like? Why?	Ask a grown-up to help you make stamps out of potatoes.	Make up a story about your very own superhero and design them a mask!
Talk about your favourite park of the story.	Tell a story about the vegetables you have in the kitchen.	Ask your grown up to hide some vegetables round the house. How many can you find and rescue?

The Tiger Who Came to Tea by Judith Kerr

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
What would you do if a talking tiger came to your house?	Make some food for a tiger tea party. You could use the cake recipe here .	Enjoy another book by Judith Kerr – try <i>Mog the</i> forgetful cat.
What would your grown-up say if a tiger came to tea?	Make your own tea cups for the tiger.	Find out as many tiger facts as you can with your grown-up.
Why do you think the tiger never came back?	Make your own tiger ears and pretend to be a tiger. How loud can you roar?	Go and see a real tiger. You could watch them online or visit them in the Yorkshire Wildlife park.

Rapunzel by Paul O. Zelinsky

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
How would you escape from a tall tower?	Make your own tower for Rapunzel – you could use bits of cardboard.	Enjoy another fairy tale - you can borrow one from your library.
Is it okay to take things from other people? Have you ever taken anything that didn't belong to you?	Use blocks to make a really tall tower? How high can you build it? Can you build the taller one than someone else?	Have a go at plaiting your own hair, or maybe try it on someone you live with.
How does Rapunzel feel when she is all by herself in the tower?	Pretend to be the witch. Can you make a scary witch face?	There are lots of versions of Rapunzel – try the one by Bethan Woollvin.

Owl Babies by Martin Waddell

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Who do you miss when they are not there?	Go into your garden when it is dark. What can you see?	Go for a walk in the woods. Can you see any owls? What other animals can you find?
Which owl do you like the most from the story?	Use cotton wool to make your own fluffy baby owl.	Enjoy another book about owls. You might like <i>Wow!</i> said the Owl by Tim Hopgood.
What are your favourite things about the night time?	Make your own owl puppet and perform your own version of the story.	Borrow a non-fiction book from your library about owls.

Dirty Bertie by David Roberts

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Do you do anything naughty like Bertie?	Create a character profile of Dirty Bertie – draw all his features and include labels.	Explore the <u>Dirty Bertie</u> website!
What is the naughtiest thing Bertie does?	Do you know any other messy characters like <i>Dirty Bertie</i> ?	Enjoy another book about a naughty boy. You might like <i>Horrid Henry</i> by Francessca Simon.
Would you like it if <i>Dirty Bertie</i> was in your class?	Give some toys a wash outside. Can you make them clean?	Find out more about how you can keep clean with these Little Princess activities.

Dear Zoo by Rod Campbell

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Which is your favourite zoo animal?	Draw or make your own animal for the zoo to send home.	Enjoy another Rod Campbell book. You might enjoy <i>Our Jungle</i> .
Can you remember what is behind each flap before you open it?	Where would you put a pet from the zoo? Would it live in your bedroom or somewhere else?	Find out more about your favourite animal. You could borrow a book from the library.
Do you have any pets? Do they ever do anything naughty?	Pretend to be an animal. Can your grown-up guess what you are?	Go to the pet shop. What pets can you see there? Which is your favourite?

Man on the Moon by Simon Bartram

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Why didn't Bob see any of the aliens?	Make your own model of the moon. Can you find lots of places to hide aliens?	Read and explore <i>Whatever Next!</i> by Jill Murphy on the <u>Words for Life</u> website.
The man on the moon has a lot of things to do before he gets to work. What do you do before you go out in the morning?	Look at all the moon souvenirs. Can you make your own moon souvenir?	Find out more about Bob's adventures. You can borrow more Bob books from the library.
What would you explore if you worked on the moon?	Can you find all the aliens hiding in the book?	Build a spaceship and see if you can make it fly.

Who keeps you safe when you're feeling scared?	Use objects to make your own crashes and bangs like a storm?	Play the <u>rain game</u> and tell your own story.
What helps you get to sleep?	Which is your favourite bedtime story? Make a cosy den to share it in.	Find another good bedtime story. You might like <i>Mog</i> and Bunny by Judith Kerr.

Have you ever been on a funny adventure like Paddington?	Make your own suitcase like Paddington. What will you put in it?	Enjoy another <i>Paddington</i> adventure. There are lots to borrow in your local library.
The Browns are very kind to Paddington. Who is kind to you? How are they kind?	Make a <i>Paddington</i> <u>finger</u> <u>puppet.</u>	What do you know about London? Use the internet or library to find out more.
What would Paddington do if he came to your house?	Make your own marmalade sandwich. How does it taste?	Read another book about bears. You might enjoy We're going on a bear hunt by Michael Rosen.

Aliens Love Underpants by Claire Freedman

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Which is your favourite pair of pants in the book?	Draw a pair of pants that the aliens would like.	Enjoy another book about space.
How many aliens can you find on the picture at the back of the book? Which one do you like best?	Invent your own alien – sketch them and include labels.	Who else loves underpants? There are lots of books here you might like by <u>Claire</u> <u>Freedman</u> .
Where would aliens hide if they came to your house?	Get your grown up to hide some paper aliens in your house. Can you find them all?	Listen to the Claire Freedman reading the story.

George and the Dragon by Christopher Wormell

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Are you scared of anything smaller than you?	Make a mouse <u>puppet</u> to scare any dragons away.	Enjoy another story about dragons. You might like <i>Zog</i> by Julia Donaldson.
George gets lots of cheese as a reward for scaring away the dragon. What would you want as your reward?	How would you scare away a dragon? See if you can scare your grown up.	Make a cave for <i>George and</i> the <i>Dragon</i> and put some special items inside.
Did you like the dragon's cave? What would be in your cave?	Make a scary dragon. What will it look like?	Find out more about <u>St.</u> <u>George's day</u> .

Little Red Riding Hood by Susanna Davidson

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Red Riding Hood helps her grandmother. Who do you like to help?	Hide behind a corner and roar like a wolf to scare a friend.	Go for a walk in the woods. You could take your own basket of food and have a picnic.
The wolf tricked Red Riding Hood. Has anyone ever tricked you?	Make your own masks to tell the story to someone else.	Find out more about wolves. You could borrow a book from your library.
The woodcutter saves everyone. Can you think of anyone else who saves people?	Use a matchbox to make a mini sized bed for the wolf.	Read and explore <u>The Three</u> <u>Little Pigs</u> , another traditional story featuring a wolf.

The Very Hungry Caterpillar by Eric Carle

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
The caterpillar ate a lot of food. What food do you like?	Make your own caterpillar our of stones or pebbles – try painting them!	Grow your own caterpillar. Can you grow it into a butterfly?
Poor caterpillar got a tummy ache from all the food. Have you ever had a tummy ache? How did it feel?	Paint on one half of a piece of paper then fold it in half to turn it into a butterfly.	Enjoy listening to the <u>The</u> <u>Very Hungry Caterpillar</u> .
Can you remember all the things that the caterpillar ate?	Can you find any butterflies outside? What colours are they?	Ask in your library to borrow another book by Eric Carle.

The Day the Crayons Quit by Drew Daywalt

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Which is your favourite colour?	Make your own crayon people using empty toilet rolls.	Use your favourite colour to write a postcard – you can ask your grown up to help.
Which crayon do you like most in the story?	Which colours do your friends like best? Can you find out?	Enjoy the next book in the series — The Day the Crayons Came Back.
What would your crayons say if they could talk?	Can you make a picture with all your colours so no crayon feels left out?	Take your crayons on their own adventure. You could take photos of them having fun outside.

We're Going on a Bear Hunt by Michael Rosen

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Read the story again and join in with the actions and noises.	Take your own cuddly bear to the woods.	Try <u>Bear Hunt</u> activities on the Words of Life website.
Do you think the bear wanted to play at the end of the story?	Explore all the things the family walked through such as ice, grass, sticks. What do they feel like?	Listen to Michael Rosen read the story.
Have you ever been on an adventure with your family?	Find out more about bears. What do they like to eat? Where do they live?	Read and explore <u>Peace at</u> <u>Last</u> by Jill Murphy, another book about bears.

The Three Little Pigs by Nicola Baxter

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
The wolf is really good at blowing things down. What would you want to huff and puff and blow down?	Can you make a strong house for a little pig.	Ask in your library for a different fairy tale.
What materials would you use to build your house?	Try these <u>Three Little Pig</u> activities on the Words for Life website.	Go and visit a farm to see if you can see real pigs.
What would you tell the wolf if he wanted to come in your house?	Make some puppets so you can tell the story to someone else.	Find out what you can move just by blowing it. Can you move a rock? Can you move a feather?

Winnie the Witch by Valerie Thomas

Do you know any other stories about witches?	Make your own magic wand and see if you can put and spell on someone.	Enjoy another story about witches. You might enjoy <i>Meg and Mog</i> by Helen Nicoll.
Winnie finds her spells tricky to get right. What do you find tricky to get right?	Download the <u>Winnie the</u> <u>Witch activities</u> from the Words for Life website.	Find some sticks and twigs outside so you can make a broom for Winnie
Which pet would you like to have to help you if you were a witch?	Ask a grown-up to help you make your own potion. What are its magic powers?	Enjoy another <i>Winnie the Witch</i> book. Ask in your library to borrow one.

The Book with No Pictures by B. J. Novak

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Say some of the silly words in the story. Can you say them in a funny voice?	Make your own book with no pictures. Ask a grown-up to write your words for you if you need help.	Find more books like this. Ask your library to find out what they have.
Did you like this book as much as books with pictures in?	Draw some pictures that could go alongside this book.	Enjoy another B. J Novak book. You might like <i>The alphabet book with no pictures</i> .
What did you find funny about this book?	Invent your own silly words and definitions.	Tell someone else what you thought about this book and see if they enjoy it.

There's a Dragon in Your Book by Tom Fletcher

Can you think of anything else that might help the dragon?	Play <i>Simon says</i> Listen carefully to the directions to do the right action.	Make your own baby dragon.

Have you ever lost something when you were out? Did you ever find it again?	Draw your own broom. Can you make a space for everyone on it?	Play in the mud and make your own mud monster.
What was the scariest thing about the monster?	Can you find any rhyming words in the book?	Find out more about the illustrations in <u>Room on the</u> <u>Broom</u> by Julia Donaldson.

The Cat in the Hat by Dr. Seuss

Can you make up your own silly rhymes?	Make your own cat puppet. What silly things will he get up to?	Enjoy another book by Dr. Seuss. There are lots to choose from. Ask in your local library.
What would you do if the cat came to your house?	Can you make your own hat? You could draw lots of rhyming things on it.	Enjoy another rhyming book. You might enjoy Giraffe's can't dance by Giles Andreae.
How would you catch Thing 1 and Thing 2 if they came to your house?	Make a picture to show the funniest part of the story.	Share some <u>nursery rhymes</u> . Can you learn one you don't already know?

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Ruby loves getting Toby for her birthday. What is the best gift you have ever been given?	Create a missing pet poster for Toby. Include a drawing and important information about Toby.	Explore the Holly Webb site and decide what else you would like to read.
Toby is lost and alone in the woods. How do you think Ruby feels?	Find out more about caring for a puppy on the RSPCA website .	Write a book review of <i>The Lost Puppy</i> to share with other people.
Have you ever got lost? How did you feel?	Find out more about Daschunds. Can you make a leaflet to share the information?	Enjoy another animal story. You might like <i>The Pug who</i> wanted to be a Unicorn by Bella Swift.

Was the Iron Woman right to turn all the men in the waste disposal plant into swamp creatures?	Make your own <i>Iron Woman</i> from bits of recycling.	Research Ted Hughes and find out about his links to Mexborough.
How did this book make you think about the environment?	Find out about <i>The Iron Man</i> . How is he different to <i>The Iron Woman</i> ?	Try some of these environmental activities.

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Peggy tries to turn herself into something she isn't. Have you ever tried to change yourself?	See if you can create creatures made up of two animals such as a dog and unicorn – a doggycorn!	Find out about the <u>RSPCA</u> and how they rehome dogs.
Should you change yourself for someone else?	Make a poster to advertise for a new home for Peggy. What does Peggy need from her new home?	Write a letter to your local MP to encourage them to do more to help pets without homes.
Does Peggy remind you of any other characters from other stories you have read?	Are there any more books by Bella Swift you might enjoy? Click on the link to explore her books.	Write a review of this book to persuade other people to read it.

Judy Moody: Around the World in 8 ½ days by Megan McDonald

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Have you ever fallen out with your friends at school. How did you sort it out?	Can you make up some more rhyming characters like <i>Judy Moody</i> ? Give them rhyming names and personalities.	Find a map of the world and think about where you would like to go.
Have you ever forgotten to do something important? What happened?	Look at some more books in the Judy Moody series. Which one will you read next?	Choose a country you don't know and find out some more about it. What food do they eat? What do they wear?
Have you ever had someone new join your class? How did you make them feel welcome?	Make a poster to encourage children to look after new people to school.	Make a travel journal to show all the places Judy Moody went. Where should she go next? What might happen there?

The Hodgeheg by Dick King-Smith

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
What did you think when Max tried to cross the road?	Make a <u>hedgehog home</u> to help them hibernate.	Research Hedgehog crossings. Are there any near you?
Can you make links to other stories where someone needs to cross a road or bridge?	Make a <u>road safety</u> poster to help children cross the road safely.	Go to your local park and see if you can find any evidence of hedgehogs.
Have you ever managed to do something that was really tricky to begin with?	Can you draw a picture of The Hodgeheg using the descriptions from the book?	Find out how to help hedgehogs if they get poorly.

Are there any words/phrases that you haven't heard before?	Draw your own world for the top of <i>The Faraway Tree</i> . Write a paragraph to describe why it's special.	Find out more about Enid Blyton. What other stories has she written?
Discuss all the characters in the book. Which is your favourite and why?	Go and visit a local forest or woods. Can you find any trees which could be big enough to be a magical tree?	Research amazing tree houses using the internet. Which one would you most like to live in?
Which far away land did you like the most? Why?	Can you think of a new character to live in <i>The Faraway Tree</i> ?	Research forest creatures. What other creatures might live in the enchanted wood? What would their home look like?

Do you know any other characters who are like Mr Krupp?	Can you draw a character from the book. Use <u>Dav</u> <u>Pilkey's</u> website to help.	Create your own comic book. Use this generator to get your comic book name.
What would you do if you could hypnotise your head teacher?	Design your own supervillain. What powers do they have? What is their wicked plan?	Try a graphic novel and use these tips to help you choose. You could read them online with your library card.

The Little Mermaid by Hans Christian Anderson

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Write a list of everything you know about mermaids.	Enjoy different versions of the Little Mermaid. How do the endings differ? Which do you prefer and why?	Research oceans and find out how they are affected by global warming.
Would you prefer to be a human or a mermaid? Why?	Ask a grown-up to help you make a potion like the Sea Witch used.	Read and enjoy other books about the <u>ocean</u> .
The mermaid is very brave to leave the sea. What is the bravest thing you've ever done?	Build a model of your own sea world using any materials you can find at home.	The Ancient Greeks referred to mermaids as sirens – how are they different to The Little Mermaid?

The Worst Witch by Jill Murphy

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Is Mildred like other witches you have read about?	Draw and name a pet for Mildred. Consider what their looks and personality.	Create your own Worst Witch adventure. What will Mildred do? Which of her friends and teachers will be in the story?
Are any of your teachers like the teachers in the book?	Write your own spell. What does it do?	Read another book about a famous witch or wizard. Ask your teacher for their suggestion.
Which character is the most like you? Why?	Create your own teacher for Mildred's school. What will they teach? What are they like?	Find out more about <u>Jill</u> <u>Murphy</u> .

The 117-Storey Treehouse by Andy Griffiths and Terry Denton

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
If you were only allowed two storeys in your tree house, what would be on them?	Invent your own tree house! Draw a picture of it and add lots of labels – be as detailed as possible.	Build your own tree house or den in your garden – you can even use things like blankets and chairs.
What would you expect on the other side of a door of doom?	Create a new character for the story. What are they like? Are they a villain or a goodie?	Draw a comic strip for very own treehouse story.
Which stories would you report to the story police?	Build a model of the tree using bits of recycling.	Enjoy another book from the same series. Ask in your local library for suggestions.

Talk about a time when you were brave.	Make your own book of dragons. What dragons can you create? What will they do?	Find out more about Cressida Cowell. Are there anymore books she has written that you might enjoy?
Why do you think Toothless trusts Hiccup?	Draw a map of the island of Berk and label some landmarks.	Find out more about the Vikings. Are they similar to the characters in the book?

Conversation starters	Quick and easy activities	When you have more time
Hogarth and Iron Man are friends. How do they help each other?	Create your own Iron Man drawing.	See if you can find out more about Ted Hughes – what are his links to Doncaster?
What is this book trying to teach us?	The Iron Man likes to eat farm equipment. What else should he eat? Draw a plate with a meal for him.	The Iron man wants people to look after the planet. Find out what you can do to look after the planet.
Which was your favourite part of the book and why?	Create your own Iron Man sculpture from scrap materials or bits of recycling.	Read <i>The Iron Woman</i> by Ted Hughes.

What do you think of George and Harold?	Draw your own hero that is part-animal and part-human. What powers do they have?	Read <i>Captain Underpants</i> by <u>Dav Pilkey</u> – it's another book on the Doncaster 100 Reads list.
