

Clothes peg crocodiles

This fun craft activity allows your child to pretend they're the crocodile from the book. Can you use it to retell the story with them? This encourages memory skills and builds vocabulary.

3. Give your crocodile a scaly spine!

Fold a pipe cleaner to make a zig zag shape, or zigzag a paper strip, and add it on top of your crocodile's back.



If you have some pipe cleaner left, you could use it to add some legs too.
